Vale Ron Young

Ron joined the Ports Stephens Community Woodworkers Inc. (our Club) on the 18th May, 2002. He was member number 58. He, and his wife Gillian, initially lived in Corlette before moving to Shoal Bay prior to their departure for Moss Vale.

I am not aware of their exact departure date but, according to "Woodnews," he was here in December 2017, but not here in February, 2018.

During his time with us, he was a very active member, specialising in carving. He was an excellent carver in his own right and often gave talks to Club Members on how to improve their carving skills. The current **Woodworker of the Year Award** was made by him, and represents the head of a cassowary.

As an expert carver, Ron visited what he considered to be the Mecca of Carving, namely the School of Carving in Austria. He visited the "School" on 3 occasions and, on the last visit, was accompanied by the Millers.

Whilst on this last visit, he purchased some progressively carved figures/items, on behalf of the Club, which are still on display under the TV in the workshop. They show the various stages of carving from the basic initial shape to the near finished product. At a Monthly Meeting, shortly after his return, he gave a very detailed account of what he saw, what he did, and what he learned during his trip. For those of us who knew him, once he was wound up, he was hard to stop.

On one occasion, Ron organised a carver from Sydney to come and give a demonstration to the Club on Fantail Carving which was a great success. After the visit, he invited the Guest Speaker, and some members, to his home for lunch. On another occasion, he invited a guest speaker to talk on Marquetry, a skill in which Ron was also very proficient.

He was an extrovert, and I say this in the kindest way, always willing to pass on his knowledge of carving to anyone who was interested. I'm sure everyone in the Club knew who he was.

He also ran the Raffle for the club for several years prior to Graham Miller taking over the job.

He was very good friends with the Millers and also, Gordon Treble, a former member, who also moved from here some time ago. I believe that Ron and Gordon had known each other in their youth and had shared many good times together.

Ron died recently from the aftermath of a foot infection which turned nasty. I'm sure he will be missed by many.

Vale Tony Mackay

Tony Mackay was born in Grafton, northern New South Wales on 26 October 1950.

Tony boarded at Farrar Boarding School from 1962. He finished his schooling at Bega High School, where he participated in boxing, swimming, and diving. He met his wife in a pub in Kirribilli and they were married in 1973 In 1979, Tony and Sue embarked on a trip across Europe including Italy, Spain and France and cruising the Greek islands

In 1980, Tony completed his Bachelor of Architecture from the NSW Institute of Technology.

He began his professional career working for Public Works in Sydney and Bathurst, where he was involved with designing the Bathurst goal. He eventually settled in Newcastle, which became an important part of his life and where he co-founded an architecture practice with his colleague Nick Georgiou.

In 1990, Tony began working at the University of Newcastle, primarily focusing on writing textbooks for Architecture and Construction Management and where he served as a lecturer. Tony's work at the university also provided him with opportunities to travel abroad, including a trip to Delph in the Netherlands.

In 2012, while his daughter Kirsten was working in Germany, the family embarked on a tour through Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, and Scandinavia.

Around 2016, Tony resigned from his architectural practice and moved to Shoal Bay.

In 2022, he joined the Woodies and helped with Council approval of the DA for our morning tea area.

Tony enjoyed engaging in heated discussions and disagreements with others, fostering close relationships based on banter.

Tony leaves his wife Sue and two daughters.
